

I first learned about lichens as bio-monitors in a conversation with Pat Kociolek, Director of the University of Colorado Museum of Natural History, and was led to a small yet powerful book by James N. Corbridge and William A. Weber, *A Rocky Mountain Lichen Primer*. Many of the artworks generated in this exhibition are directly inspired by Weber's personal and passionate interest in lichen, and when one begins to look at lichen, one never sees the world the same again. It is the stalwart life of the lichens as well as their beauty that draws us forward to see everything in life related to their expression.

The title of the exhibition refers to a quote in the introduction of Weber's *Lichen Primer* about the web of ...

"In an effort to turn the proverbial lemons into lemonade, Los Angeles-based artist Kim Abeles is turning air pollution into art.  
 For her current exhibit in Boulder, Colorado, Kim worked with middle school students to capture and create art from smog. They placed stencils on white dinner plates, and placed those plates on the school's roof. Seven months later the stencils were removed. Left on the plates were smog images composed of particles that had settled out of the atmosphere.

compare carbon, lead and other pollutants in specific locations. They can be found on rocks and trees for instance, and mostly we walk or drive past them, overlooking their spectacular structure, colors and longevity.

Lichens, as bio-monitors, indicate air quality as they absorb from their environment both the air and moisture. Because of this miracle, they are collected and studied in the lab to
